### INNOVATIVE PROJECTS GRANT

Family and Consumer Science Experiment: Growing Bacteria, Knowledge, and Understanding.

By incorporating the scientific method and laboratory equipment provided by this grant, the goal is to put the "Science" back into Family and Consumer Science. Food safety and sanitation is an important unit in the FCS curriculum because millions of Americans get sick from food-borne illnesses each year. The use of equipment such as an incubator, Petri dishes, nutrient agar, and cotton swabs provide students with the opportunity to view the bacteria that can be found in many unsuspecting locations in our kitchens. It will further reinforce proper cleaning and food-handling procedures.

The materials purchased with this grant allowed students to find out which locations in the kitchen and which types of foods contain the greatest amount of bacteria.

Students hypothesized within their lab groups which items they believe to contain the most bacteria. They then collected and labeled samples from different locations in the kitchen such as countertops, tables, handles, and floors or other items such as the hands, and cooked vs. uncooked foods.

Students looked at bacteria collected in a Petri dish filled with agar, jelly-like substance used to culture bacteria. Bacteria grows in colonies, and a bacterial colony is a visible cluster of bacteria growing on the surface allowing students to see the bacteria and its growth.
